Dear Parents & Guardians

In this Term 3 issue, we have featured events chronologically from late May to end August to give you a sense of what students continued to experience in school. Our students had an exciting term participating in academic and co-curricular activities ranging from the Drama Elective Programme showcases, History Challenge to National Day, National School Games, learning journeys, enrichment activities among others. Of special fondness to our KC family was to welcome once again, a teacher and 10 students from Fukuoka Futaba School, our sister school in Fukuoka, Japan. We also closed the term strongly celebrating Teachers' Day as one big KC Family.

#### **KC Career Day**

'Preparing Today for Tomorrow' was the theme for this year's Career Day on 31 May which brought together professionals from diverse careers - such as cybersecurity, library and archives, media, law, healthcare, finance and marketing, early childhood, social services and the military - to speak with our graduating cohort.

Through the lively and engaging sharing of our esteemed speakers from our alumni, parents and industry partners, our girls' view of the world of work was widened.

Particularly, they developed an appreciation for different career pathways and how one's career could make a positive difference to others.

#### **Netball Carnival**

KC netball participated in the 2023 Springfield Secondary School Netball Carnival on 21 June, where both B and C division players competed with 4 other schools in a round-robin format of 15 minutes each. Our players demonstrated grit and competitiveness in every match, learning from their mistakes and performing better in subsequent matches. We are proud to achieve a 3rd placing for the C division team and 2nd placing for the B division team.

#### **Floorball**

The Floorball team has done well this term!

In the Storveta Cup organised by Youth Floorball Academy and Storverta Innebandy Uppsala, that took place from 23 to 25 June, our U14 and U16 girls have done us proud. Our U14 girls won the 1st team placing while our U16 girls won the 1st runner up.

The girls also participated in the U15 SG Open 2023 which was held on 8 and 9 July. It is the biggest and largest international floorball tournament in Asia, rendering it a tough competition. Nevertheless, our U15 girls emerged 1st runner up despite the stiff competition.

On 22 and 23 July, our floorball girls took part in the ActiveSG PESTA Sukan Floorball Championship 2023 in the U14 category. Our team competed against 9 other schools and the girls' hard work paid off, as our U14 girls defended our 2022 championship valiantly to keep the championship title.

Our C division floorball team wrapped up their season on a high note, securing a triumphant victory in the 3rd/4th placing match. This achievement earned them the well-deserved title of 2nd runner-up in the National School Games Floorball Championship. The unwavering support of our Sec 2 students, led by the house captains, was evident as they attended the match and cheered wholeheartedly. Their enthusiastic support greatly uplifted the team's spirit throughout the match.

# <u>Drama Elective Programme (DEP)</u>

On the eve of Youth Day, we celebrated the vibrant spirit of our youth at the SYF Celebrations 2023 Festival Concert, with the gracious presence of Mr. Chan Chun Sing, our Minister for Education. Our Sec 3 DEP students collaborated with students from two other DEP schools to stage an interactive play that ignited enthusiasm among the audience at the Esplanade Theatre. Our students not only forged beautiful friendships with their fellow drama enthusiasts but also gained valuable experience performing on a national platform. We want to thank the parents for their unwavering support through the tireless rehearsals! Your encouragement has been instrumental in our students' success!

On 6 and 7 July, the Sec 4 DEP students presented their graduating showcase of their drama coursework consisting of monologues excerpted from local plays and pieces they devised themselves. Over the two days, the drama students transformed into different characters as they interrogated the concerns of 21st century life, from the very identifiable problems of finding the perfect shoe, to the darker realities of the flaws and necessities of boundaries. Using everyday items like rice and cardboard boxes, and situating characters' lives within frames and doors, the students opened the audience's eyes to all the eye (i) cannot see, to discover perspectives and paradigms not previously considered. Stage managed by the Sec 3 DEP students as part of their learning of performance support, the showcase was a triumph, with parents and students alike celebrating the possibilities that drama allows.

#### Entrepreneur Club – Financial Literacy for Youths (FLY) Challenge

On 8 July, 15 Entrepreneur Club girls participated in the inter-school FLY Challenge organised by Republic Polytechnic with the aim of promoting financial awareness among secondary school students in Singapore.

This national competition opened to all secondary schools saw a total of 40 participating teams. Our Entrepreneur Club sent 4 teams comprising 4 girls each. In this Challenge, participants were guided by Polytechnic students from the Common Business Programme as they engaged in a series of financial literacy games and quizzes.

#### T:>Works Annual 24-Hour Playwriting Competition

Over 15 and 16 July from 11am on Saturday to 11am on Sunday, 24 students from the Sec 3 full literature and upper secondary DEP participated in the annual T:>Works 24-hour Playwriting Competition. This year the competition returned to the on-site sleepover, this time held at Figment Club House, a carefully conserved shophouse. The themed element of conservation, transition, and transformation was only revealed on the day of the competition, and various stimuli were provided throughout the 24 hours which the students needed to incorporate into their script including a walk through the neighborhood to experience its sights and sounds. Armed with a myriad of snacks and opportunities to talk with other playwrights both professional and amateur, the students survived the 24 hours to successfully complete and submit their original plays.

# **Singapore Secure Mobile Exhibition**

Living in peace and security is taken for granted by many in Singapore. Yet, it is necessary to be aware and informed that there are existing and real threats that could potentially devastate our country. Hence, as part of the suite of Humanities partnership programme, KC snagged an opportunity to host the above from 17 to 21 July. The exhibition was put together by the Home Team.

Students browsed and examined the exhibition over the course of the week. In the process, they could better understand the nature and spectrum of terrorist threats. Critically, they learnt how best to respond should a tragedy occur. A call for calm, unity, and resilience to overcome the fallout completed the exhibition. Towards the end of the term, KC's annual emergency lockdown and evacuation exercise put into reality the scenarios outlined. Overall, it was a timely reminder that it is necessary to be prepared than to be caught off guard.

To encourage active engagement with the exhibits, students also participated in a school-based quiz that saw Sec 1/1, 1/3 and 3/3 emerged as the most participative classes.

# **Hope for the Homeless**

The CCA Council carried out a project: Hope for the Homeless, in partnership with New Hope Community Services, a social service agency that seeks to empower the homeless. Over the span of two weeks, the Council raised awareness on the issue of homelessness in Singapore, as well as conducted a food donation drive to give back to this community.

Through a presentation and infographics, the Council debunked myths about homelessness, including their accommodation arrangements, and shared more on causes of homelessness. An experiential booth was also set-up for students to view rough sleeping conditions modelled after real profiles, and they were invited to learn more via news articles and interviews.

With the help of CCA leaders, the CCA groups came together and successfully conducted the food donation drive to four of New Hope's shelters.

In all, awareness of homelessness was raised within the school community. We hope that in our individual capacities as well, empathy will be extended to this community of people.

# **Art Learning Journey to Singapore Art Museum**

Despite a rainy afternoon on 20 July, our Sec 3 Art students and Sec 1 DSA Visual Art students ventured out to visit the Singapore Art Museum at its unconventional home at Tanjong Pagar Distripark. The girls experienced three exhibitions of both local and international contemporary art - Hito Steyerl's Factory of the Sun, Lila: Unending Play by Jane Lee, and SAM Contemporaries: Residues & Remixes.

The works on display were thought-provoking and conceptually demanding; it was truly a testament to KC's Art programme that even our Sec 1 students were able to keep an open mind and approach these works with curiosity. Aided by a Learning Journey resource designed specially for the visit, students closely observed and meaningfully discussed the works, honing their visual and analytical skills, and gaining a sense of possibilities for their own art practice.

# Kindness@KC Movement

The Class Council rallied the KC Family on a campaign, Kindness@KC, to promote appreciation and respect within the school community. Inspired by the school's theme of the year, "Love one another", these student leaders designed a series of activities that spanned the first 4 weeks of Term 3 to engage everyone in this meaningful cause.

The school community was first invited to share their memories of acts of kindness and how it made a difference in their lives, and these topics were further explored through weekly podcasts featuring entertaining and thought-provoking dialogues between students and teachers. The school community had the opportunity to learn how to understand themselves and others better through a Care Bear Personality test, and exercised this renewed understanding about kindness through a BINGO competition where students completed challenges to show acts of kindness to schoolmates and staff members.

#### **Book Club**

On 24 July, 13 students from the Book Club had the privilege of visiting the Kinokuniya Bookstore at Takashimaya. It was a wonderful afternoon of exploration into the workings of the flagship bookshop. The students learnt about the challenges of keeping a bookstore open, considering the competition from online stores and the changes in the reading diets of young people today. We also enjoyed an appreciation of the Japanese philosophy toward reading as well as the principles behind the architectural design features of the store. The girls left with their eyes wide open and their awareness raised to the beauty of reading and the magic that is a bookshop.

# 13th Worldskills ASEAN Competition

On 25 July, a group of 18 students from Sec 3/7 and 3/1 went on an Education Career Guidance (ECG) learning journey to the Education Career Guidance Fair – 13<sup>th</sup> Worldskills ASEAN Competition at Suntec Singapore Convention and Exhibition Centre. Prior to the learning journey, the students completed lessons assigned to them in Student Learning Space portal as part of the pre-activity to the ECG Fair which involved them learning about the jobs and skills required for various career sectors such as infocomm technology, creative arts and fashion as well as social and personal services.

During the learning journey, the students continued to explore and take charge of their own ECG journey through exploration of opportunities and discovering possibilities as they took part in hands-on activities at the Try-a-Skill booths and workshops, interacted with professionals at the talks and exhibition booths as well as witnessed the Worldskills competition among ASEAN youths in 22 skill areas and more, which was the highlight of the learning journey.

During their Character and Citizenship Education lessons in the following week, the students continued to reflect on their learning at the ECG Fair with their form teachers and classmates, under the guidance of our ECG counsellor, Ms Sherry Long. We hope the students will find the learning useful when they consider their post-secondary course options.

#### **Girl Guides: Baden-Powell Award**

We would like to congratulate Joanna Gabrielle Teo Syu Lay (Sec 4/3) and Marissa-Faith Heng Yee Yin (Wang Yiyin) (Sec 2/4) for attaining the Baden-Powell Award. This award is conferred to Girl Guides who have demonstrated leadership qualities and proficient programme planning. Named after the founder of the movement, Lord Baden-Powell, the Award is the highest badge awarded by the Chief Commissioner of Girl Guides Singapore which represents the Girl Guide's commitment to the Guide Promise and Law.

The process to obtain this award is a long one. In order to be nominated by a Guider for this award, a Guide would need at least a Silver Badge Award in the five-point programme and at least eight proficiency or interest badges. Prior to taking the test to be conferred this award, Joanna and Marissa-Faith consistently improved their skills and knowledge, demonstrated sound leadership in managing the company and supporting her patrol members' growth respectively; they showed that they are self-driven and reflective leaders who are open to feedback.

Then, they had to pass two test components: a written test and an execution test. They successfully planned 2 Guides sessions based on the theme, 'Our World, Our Peaceful Future', taking into consideration the school's events in semester one. The execution test required Joanna and Marissa-Faith to carry out one of their weekly plans with Girl Guides from a different school online; they engaged them in relevant, meaningful activities and in a confident and caring manner.
